Outlined below please find a summary of significant observations regarding performance of the State's Funds for the period ended June 30, 2014. In addition, we have included supplementary comments focusing on performance that the State has experienced over the past fiscal year. We hope this summary will facilitate your review of our Investment Performance Analysis Report.

The Total Fund returned 3.0% during the second quarter, as capital markets delivered generally positive returns in a muted volatility environment. Longer-term performance for the Total Fund is also strong, with the State earning returns of 6.1% and 8.3% per annum, over the trailing three- and five-year periods.

The Total Fund outperformed its custom benchmark over all trailing periods, indicating strong relative contributions to performance from the State's active managers. Relative to the All Master Trust Universe, the State's portfolios have lower strategic exposure to equities, which can be a headwind for peer rankings in a persistent "risk-on" environment. However, the State continues to generate more return for each unit of risk exposure, with risk-adjusted returns ranking in the top 10% of all Plans over the trailing ten-year time period.

The State's investment pools produced positive returns during the second quarter, with each of the nine pools outperforming their respective custom benchmarks. Public equity returns were higher than fixed income on an absolute basis during the quarter, so investment pools with larger strategic allocations to public equities achieved higher absolute returns than investment pools with larger strategic allocations to fixed income.

Minutes from the Fed's June meeting revealed it would end its quantitative easing program by October, and that it has no set date to raise rates despite investor expectations. The State's fixed income structure outperformed the Barclays US Aggregate Bond Index during the quarter, returning 2.3% versus 2.1% for the index. All of the State's fixed income strategies outperformed or tracked their respective benchmarks, with the exception of Convertibles. On an absolute basis, the State's TIPS and Emerging Market Debt portfolios outperformed all other fixed income asset classes during the quarter.

U.S. equities finished the quarter with strong performance despite headwinds caused by negative U.S. GDP data and geopolitical instability experienced early in the quarter. The S&P 500 Index earned 5.2% and 24.6% over the quarter and trailing

one-year periods, respectively. The State's U.S. equity portfolio performed in line with the S&P 500 Index during the quarter and returned 25.5% over the trailing one-year period. Gabelli, the State's small/mid-cap value equity manager outperformed the Russell 2500 Value Index by 1.1% during the quarter.

During the second quarter, the ECB took measures to increase liquidity for stressed banks and incentivized extension of credit to the economy through a higher interest rate on reserves. Amidst such activity, developed international equity markets continued to lag U.S. markets as the MSCI EAFE Index returned 4.1%. While instability in Russia and Ukraine initially weighed heavily on emerging markets, concerns quickly dissipated, allowing the MSCI Emerging Markets Index to earn 6.6% and outperform U.S. and developed international equities during the quarter. The State's international equity portfolio returned 4.6% during the quarter, underperforming its custom index by 0.4%. All of the State's active international equity managers underperformed the MSCI ACW Ex US Index during the second quarter, mainly attributable to stock selection.

Both core real estate and absolute return assets returned positive absolute and mixed relative performance during the second quarter. The State's core real estate portfolio returned 2.6%, with both income and capital appreciation contributing to returns. Clarion and UBS, the State's two core real estate managers, returned 2.7% and 2.5% respectively versus 2.9% for the NCREIF ODCE Index. Absolute return investments performed positively during the second quarter, benefitting from strong equity and credit market performance. The State's absolute return portfolio returned 1.8% during the quarter, with each of the four managers outperforming the 1.4% earned by the HFN FOF Multi-Strat Index.

Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2014

Despite market volatility over the most recent year, all of the State's investment pools earned positive absolute and relative performance over the fiscal year. The bull market continued to produce strong results for equities, while fixed income markets were modestly positive with continued investor appetite for yield.

- The Permanent Mineral Trust and Common School Permanent Land Fund ended the fiscal year with returns of 12.7% and 12.5%, respectively. The Permanent Mineral Trust and the Common School Permanent Land Fund both outperformed their actual allocation index by 0.3%. The Permanent Land Fund and University Permanent Land Fund ended the fiscal year with returns of 12.3%, and 12.7%, each outperforming their actual allocation index by 0.3%. Hathaway Scholarship Endowment and Higher Education Endowment both outperformed during the fiscal year with returns of 11.0% and 11.1% respectively, versus 10.7% for the respective actual allocation indices.
- Performance for the Non-Permanent Funds (Workers Compensation, Tobacco Settlement, and State Agency Pool) was positive during the last year due to strong relative performance of the external fixed income managers. The Workers Compensation Fund finished the fiscal year with 9.2% vs 8.9% for its actual allocation index. The Tobacco Settlement Trust returned 5.2% versus 4.8% for its actual allocation index, and the State Agency Pool returned 4.2% versus 4.0% for its actual allocation index. Over the last year, an allocation to equities for the Workers Compensation Fund increased its absolute return compared to the other Non-Permanent Funds.



Over the last year, fixed income markets experienced persistently low interest rates despite the tapering of quantitative easing that began in March. Consensus among market analysts reveal that interest rates are expected to rise during the first half of 2015, potentially impacting fixed income performance in the near-term.

- The Total Fixed Income Portfolio (including Convertibles) produced a positive trailing fiscal year return of 5.5% compared to the Barclays US Aggregate Bond Index return of 4.4%. All of the State's asset classes in the new fixed income structure, with the exception of emerging markets debt (local), have outperformed their respective benchmarks over the trailing one-year period, indicating strong manager relative performance.
- The convertible bond portfolio underperformed the BofA Merrill Lynch All Quality Convertible Index over the trailing one-year period, returning 22.7% and 24.4%, respectively.

The State's equity and alternative investment managers performed well amidst improving global economic conditions as evidenced by the fiscal year returns below.

- The domestic large cap equity portfolio returned 24.4%, compared to 24.6% for the S&P 500 Index.
- The domestic small/mid cap equity portfolio returned 30.6%, compared to 25.6% for the Russell 2500 Index.
- The international equity portfolio returned 21.6%, compared to 21.8% for the MSCI ACW Ex US Index.
- The fixed income portfolio returned 4.7%, compared to 4.4% for the Barclays US Aggregate Bond Index.
- The core real estate portfolio returned 10.6%, compared to 12.8% for the NCREIF ODCE Index.
- The absolute return portfolio returned 10.5%, compared to 7.6% for the HFN FoF Multi-Strat Index.




Second Quarter Economic Environment


Key Economic Indicators

In the U.S., first quarter GDP growth was revised down to -2.9% and the IMF revised its 2014 U.S. growth forecast down to 2.0% from 2.8%, anticipating that the strengthening pace of recovery will only partially offset the first quarter's uninspiring performance. Following disappointing Q1 GDP numbers, recent data releases have indicated continued economic expansion and improving labor markets. In June, the economy added 288,000 jobs with the unemployment rate declining to 6.1%, the lowest rate since September 2008, while most inflation measures ticked up marginally. On the international front, the European Central Bank (ECB) announced several policy changes intended to increase liquidity for stressed banks and businesses. The benchmark policy rate was lowered by 10 basis points to 0.15%, bringing the interest rate on excess deposits to -0.10%. The negative rate requires banks to pay the ECB interest on excess reserves, which incentivizes banks to extend credit to the economy.

Market Cap


Large and mid-cap stocks significantly outperformed small-cap and microcap equities during the quarter.

Style


While there was not much separation between value and growth stocks, value stocks edged out growth stocks by the end of the second quarter.

Sector


All major sectors had positive returns for the quarter, but the Energy sector, due to supply uncertainty, led all others in a strong quarter of equity performance. The Utilities sector also performed well, as it remains an attractive option for yield-oriented investors. In response to weak economic growth and low interest rates, many managers are positioning their portfolios to capture cyclical growth opportunities anticipated in the latter half of the year.

Second Quarter Review

Broad Market

International markets performed very comparably to U.S. markets during the second quarter. Returns for all major non-U.S. indices were positive in Q2. Market Cap


In both developed and emerging markets, large-cap stocks drastically outperformed small-cap stocks.

Developed Markets


The developed international markets generated strong absolute returns in Q2. Value continues to outperform growth over the short-term but still lags over longer time periods. Energy was the best performing sector this quarter while financials and information technology trailed the broad market.


Emerging Markets

Emerging markets had a very strong quarter, outperforming both domestic and developed markets. Russia along with Eastern Europe weighed heavily on the MSCI Emerging Markets Index as turmoil in the Ukraine persisted. Concerns quickly dissipated in May with Russian stocks nearing double-digit returns for the quarter.

Fixed Income Review As of June 30, 2014

Second Quarter Review

Broad Market

The Barclays US Aggregate index returned an unexpected 2.05% for the second quarter and brought the year-to-date return to 4.38%. This bump was unexpected due to the low yield environment in Q1 which had most investors believing the only direction yields could move was up.

US Treasury Market


US Treasuries gained 1.35% for the quarter and the US Treasury: Long index gained an impressive 12.14% year-to-date, outperforming each other fixed income index over the same time period.


Investment Grade

The appetite for yield continued in Q2 as lower quality investment-grade securities (BBB) returned 3.43% for the quarter and 7.17% year-to-date compared to 1.23% and 2.37% for AAA securities, respectively.

Non-Investment Grade

EMD returned 5.81% in Q2, a relief for investors who saw a large hit for this asset class in 2013. Improving return figures can be contributed to more compelling valuations in emerging countries after the sell-off in 2013.

Second Quarter Review - Absolute Return

General Market - Hedge Funds

Hedge funds were up broadly during the second quarter despite a difficult long/short equity environment in April. Multi-strategy funds of hedge funds were up from 1.0% to 2.5% in Q2, bringing the YTD return to 4%. Credit managers continued to perform well, benefiting from the positive carry associated with the strategy as well as marginally narrowing credit spreads. Managers were also able to capitalize on some idiosyncratic events in distressed, lower quality, and asset backed credits, helping to buoy returns.

General Market - Global Tactical Asset Allocation (GTAA)

Global Tactical Asset Allocation (GTAA) strategies posted positive results in the second quarter as most asset classes built upon gains from Q1. Risk parity strategies significantly outperformed others in the space, while those that follow a blended 60/40 index lagged those that are less benchmark constrained. Similarly, managers with allocations to REITs and energy equities also posted stronger performance in a trend reversal over the past twelve months.


Second Quarter Review - Real Assets

General Market - Diversified Inflation Strategies


Following a difficult 2013, the second quarter extended the welcome trend of strong performance in Diversified Inflation Strategies (DIS) that began in early 2014. DIS managers have rebounded through the first half of 2014 as several of the asset classes that previously dragged on results became additive to returns in Q2. REITs and MLPs provided the largest gains, and global natural resources equities contributed to the performance of several managers with long-standing strategic weights to the asset class.

General Market - Real Estate

Core U.S. Real Estate continued to exhibit positive performance, as evidenced by preliminary returns between 2% and 3%. Publicly-traded real estate also continued to produce strong returns, as demonstrated by a 7.0% return in the FTSE NAREIT All Equity REITs Index. Noticeable growth in the office market has been driven by private sector job growth, particularly in areas with heavy concentration of technology and energy companies.

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INDEX GLOSSARY

MSCI World: The **MSCI World Index** is a free float-adjusted market capitalization weighted index that is designed to measure the equity market performance of developed markets. The index consists of the following developed market countries: *Australia, Austria, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Portugal, Singapore, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, the United Kingdom, and the United States.*

S&P 500: The **S&P 500 Index (Cap Wtd)** is a commonly recognized, market-capitalization weighted index of 500 widely held equity securities designed to measure broad US equity performance.

R 2500: The **Russell 2500 Index** measures the performance of the small to mid-cap segment of the US equity market. It includes approximately 2500 of the smallest securities by market cap from the Russell 3000 Index.

R 2500 Value: The **Russell 2500 Value Index** measures the performance of the small to mid-cap value segment of the US equity market. Value stocks are securities of companies that have lower price-to-book and price earnings, higher dividend yields, and lower forecasted growth rates than growth companies. These stocks often trade at prices lower than average relative to earnings and/or book value. Because of this apparent discount and occasionally higher than average yield, these stocks tend to be defensive in nature and therefore less volatile than growth stocks.

International Equity Custom Index: The **International Equity Custom Index** consists of the MSCI EAFE Index through July 2010 and the MSCI ACW Ex US Index thereafter.

MSCI ACW Ex US: The **MSCI ACW (All Country World Index) Ex US Index** is designed to measure equity market performance in global developed and emerging markets, excluding the US. The 22 underlying developed countries are: *Australia, Austria, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Portugal, Singapore, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom.* The 23 emerging market countries are: *Brazil, Chile, China, Colombia, Czech Republic, Egypt, Greece, Hungary, India, Indonesia, Korea, Malaysia, Mexico, Peru, Philippines, Poland, Qatar, Russia, South Africa, Taiwan, Thailand, Turkey, and United Arab Emirates.*

MSCI ACW Ex US Value: The **MSCI ACW (All Country World Index) Ex US Value Index** is identical to the MSCI ACWI Ex US with the exception that it focuses specifically on the value segment of global developed and emerging markets.

MSCI EAFE: The **MSCI EAFE (Europe, Australasia, Far East) Index** is designed to measure equity market performance of 21 developed countries, excluding the US & Canada: *Australia, Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Hong Kong, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Portugal, Singapore, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom.*

Fisher Custom Benchmark: The **Fisher Custom Benchmark** consists of the MSCI EAFE Index through July 2010 and the MSCI ACW Ex US Index thereafter.

Barclays US Trsy: US TIPS: The **Barclays US Treasury: US TIPS Index** is an unmanaged index that consists of inflation-protected securities issued by the U.S. Treasury.

Barclays US Agg Bond: The **Barclays US Aggregate Bond Index** covers the US dollar-denominated, investment-grade, fixed-rate, taxable bond market of SEC-registered securities: US Treasury and agency bonds, domestic corporate debt, and mortgage-backed securities.

Credit Custom Index: The **Credit Custom Index** consists of 20% Barclays US Credit Index, 20% BofA Merrill Lynch US High Yield Master II Constrained Index, and 60% S&P/LSTA Leveraged Loan Index.



JPMorgan GBI-EM GIbI Dvf'd: The JPMorgan GBI-EM Global Diversified Total Return Index (Unhedged) is a global emerging markets index that consist or regularly traded, liquid fixed-rate, domestic currency government bonds.

Barclays US Govt: Int Trm Bond: The **Barclays US Gov't Intermediate Term Bond Index** covers public US government obligations with remaining maturities of between three and five years.

BofA ML All Convertibles: The **BofA Merrill Lynch All Convertibles Index (All Qualities)** is a market capitalization-weighted index of domestic corporate convertible securities that are convertible to common stock.

BofA ML 3 Mo US T-Bill: The BofA Merrill Lynch 3-Month US T-Bill Index consists of newly issued 90day Treasury bills.

JP Morgan Blended Index: The **JP Morgan Blended Index** consists of an equal-weighted allocation to the BofA ML 1-3 Year US Treasury Index, BofA ML 1-3 Year Agencies Index, and BofA ML 0-3 Year Weighted Average Life Mortgage Index.

NCREIF ODCE: The **NCREIF ODCE (Open End Diversified Core) Index** is an index of investment returns reporting on both a historical and current basis the results of 16 open-end commingled funds pursuing a core investment strategy, some of which have performance histories dating back to the 1970s. The NCREIF ODCE Index is capitalization-weighted and performance is time-weighted.

NCREIF Property: The **NCREIF Property Index** prepared by the National Council of Real Estate Investment Fiduciaries is a quarterly time series composite return measure for over 6,000 individual commercial real estate properties acquired in the private market for investment purposes. Total performance represents returns from appreciation and income, and includes multi-family, office, retail, and industrial properties.

HFN FOF Multi Strat: The **HFN FOF (Fund of Funds) Multi-Strategy Index** average is created by HedgeFund.net and contains over 1,600 funds of hedge funds that are each invested in multiple investment strategies.

Global Recovery Custom Index: The **Global Recovery Custom Index** consists of 50% Credit Suisse Distressed Loan Index, 20% Credit Suisse High Yield Index, and 30% ABX Index.


Investment Policy:

It is the investment policy for the State Loan and Investment Board to invest public funds of the State of Wyoming in a manner that strives for maximum safety, provides adequate liquidity to meet all operating requirements, and achieves the highest possible investment return consistent with the primary objectives of safety and liquidity.


Investment Objectives and Priorities:

- All available funds shall be invested with the following objectives and priorities:
- a) Safety of principal. Investments shall be undertaken in a manner that seeks to ensure the preservation of capital in the overall portfolio.
- b) Liquidity requirements of anticipated and unanticipated expenditures.
- c) Yield.
- d) Recognition of differing objectives and needs of various fund portfolios.
- e) Conformance with State law and other pertinent legal restrictions.
- f) Maximization of the total rate of return on investment consistent with the foregoing objectives.
- g) Diversification by asset type, security, and investment manager in order to smooth the volatility of quarterly returns.

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



Alternative Investment Comments

Reporting for Private Equity performance was changed from cost basis to the latest portfolio valuation adjusted for cash flows, consistent with the supplementary alternatives report. This methodology change involved reflecting the difference between cost value and the most recent valuation, resulting in a significant positive performance impact on the total fund during 2nd quarter 2008.

Valuations for value-added real estate and private equity were changed from a one-quarter lag to as of the most recent valuation, adjusted for subsequent cash flows. This methodology change involved reflecting all cash flows occurring during 4th quarter 2011 as of January 2012, resulting in a minor positive performance impact on the total fund during 1st quarter 2012. Investment (Cost) Values are not lagged.

Performance for value-added real estate and private equity investments is calculated on an IRR basis. For further analysis, please refer to the supplementary alternatives performance report.

Cheyenne Capital Fund valuations set forth herein could be materially different once underlying investments are realized. Market conditions at the time of exit could be substantially different than at the reporting period, resulting in valuations different than those represented above.

Miscellaneous Comments

Wyoming State Treasurer's Office fiscal year ends on June 30th.

Fixed Income style peer groups have low populations, and may cause ranks to change significantly from quarter to quarter.

Per the request of the Treasurer's Office, LDIs and Other Wyoming Investments have been re-named to Wyoming Investments.

"IM" is the acronym for Investment Metrics, the provider of peer group data used in ranking investment manager and asset class performance.

Effective March 19, 2012, Barclays Capital ("BC") indices have been rebranded to "Barclays". Naming conventions have been updated to "Barclays" or "B" to reflect the change.

During the 4th quarter of 2012, WAMCO Core Plus, Neuberger Berman Core Plus, PIMCO Core Plus, PIMCO Mortgages, JP Morgan Mortgages, WAMCO Corporates, Logan Circle, and PIMCO Global/EM began the liquidation process to transition assets to the State's new fixed income asset class structure. The proceeds were used to fund State Street TIPS, C.S. McKee, JP Morgan Core, MacKay Shields, Neuberger Berman Core, PIMCO Core, and Wells Capital. During the 1st quarter of 2013, additional assets were transitioned to Neuberger Berman Credit, Seix, Investec, and Stone Harbor.



Alpha - A measure of the difference between a portfolio's actual returns and its expected performance, given its level of risk as measured by beta. It is a measure of the portfolio's historical performance not explained by movements of the market or a portfolio's non-systematic return.

Alpha Ratio - A measure of a portfolio's non-systematic return per unit of downside risk. It is measured by dividing the alpha of a portfolio by the downside risk. The non-systematic return is a measure of a portfolio's historical performance not explained by movements of the market.

Average Quality - Bond quality ratings are reported using the investment managers' and the index providers' preferred rating agency. Average Quality for managers unable to provide this statistic has been estimated using a credit quality distribution provided by the manager. There are two primary rating agencies in the US. Moody's assigns ratings on a system that employs up to four symbols (consisting of letters and numbers) such as, Aaa, Aa2, etc., with Aaa being the highest or safest rating. Standard & Poor's (S&P) employs a system that uses + and - along with letters such as AAA, AA+, etc. The two rating agencies' systems are summarized below:

Beta - A measure of the sensitivity of a portfolio to the movements in the market. It is a measure of a portfolio's non-diversifiable or systematic risk.

Buy and Hold Attribution - At the beginning of the time period under analysis, the manager and benchmark portfolios are broken down into segments (i.e., styles, sectors, countries, and regions) based on the desired type of attribution. The formula assumes zero turn-over to the manager and benchmark portfolios throughout the period and calculates the segment returns ("buy and hold returns") to arrive at performance attribution. Due to portfolio turnover, buy and hold attribution may not accurately represent quarterly performance relative to the benchmark. Country, region, sector, and style allocations are as of the date one quarter prior to the reporting date, and the returns shown are for those segments throughout the quarter reported. Due to disclosure guidelines set by each investment manager, equity characteristics shown are as of the most recent date available. The following is the methodology for segment classification:

Sector - Attribution is calculated using the Global Industry Classification Standard (GICS) which is a detailed and comprehensive structure for sector and industry analysis. Stocks are classified by their primary sector, as defined by S&P Capital IQ data.

Country/Region - Attribution is calculated using the Morgan Stanley Capital International (MSCI) region standards. Stocks are classified by their domicile country/region, as defined by S&P Capital IQ data.

Style - Stocks are classified into the following style boxes: large/mid/small vs. growth/neutral/value. Stocks are classified along large/mid/small categories at the time of the Russell index rebalancing, using the index market cap boundaries as cutoff points. Stocks are classified along growth/neutral/value categories at the time of the Russell index rebalancing, using the price/book ratio as supplied by S&P Capital IQ. Stocks in the Russell 3000 Index portfolio are sorted by price/book ratio; names with the highest price/book ratio that make up 1/3 of the total market capitalization are assigned to the growth category, names that make up the subsequent 1/3 of the total market capitalization are assigned to the neutral category, while the balance of the names are assigned to the value category.

Portfolio Characteristics and Buy and Hold Attribution reports utilize product-specific data for all mutual funds and commingled funds.



Capital Markets Review -

Breakeven Inflation - Measures the expected inflation rate at each stated maturity by taking the difference between the real yield of the inflation-linked maturity curve and the yield of the closest nominal Treasury maturity.

Consumer Confidence - Measures domestic consumer confidence as defined by the degree of optimism on the state of the economy that consumers express through saving and spending. **Consumer Price Index (CPI)** - Measures the change in the price level of consumer goods and services.

Option-Adjusted Spread - Measures the flat spread of an index or bond to the Treasury yield curve after removing the effect of any embedded options.

Purchasing Managers Index (PMI) - Measures economic activity by surveying purchasing managers on a monthly basis as to whether business conditions have improved, worsened, or stayed the same.

US Dollar Total Weighted Index - Measures the value of the US Dollar relative to a basket of other world currencies. It is calculated as the weighted geometric mean of the dollar's value versus the EUR, GBP, CAD, SEK, CHF, and JPY.

VIX - Measures the implied volatility of S&P 500 Index options by looking at the market's expectation of the S&P 500 Index volatility over the next 30 day period. Commonly referred to as the "fear index" or the "fear gauge."

Consistency - The percentage of quarters that a product achieved a rate of return higher than that of its benchmark. The higher the consistency figure, the more value a manager has contributed to the product's performance.

Convexity - A measure of the shape of the curve that describes the relationship between bond prices and bond yields.

Correlation - A statistical measure of the relationship between asset class returns. A value of 1.00 is a perfect correlation; that is, the asset classes always move in the same direction. A value of -1.00 indicates a perfect negative correlation, in which the asset classes always move in opposite directions of each other. A value of 0 indicates there is no relationship between the direction of returns of the two asset classes. Correlation calculations only consider the direction of changes relative to two variables and not the magnitude of those changes.

Coupon Rate - The percentage rate of interest paid on a bond or fixed income security; it is typically paid twice per year.

Current Yield - The annual income of a security divided by the security's current price.

Down Market Capture - Down market by definition is negative benchmark return and down market capture represents the ratio in % terms of the average portfolios return over the benchmark during the down market period. The lower the value of the down market capture the better the product's performance.

Downside Risk - A measure similar to standard deviation, but focuses only on the negative movements of the return series. It is calculated by taking the standard deviation of the negative quarterly set of returns. The higher the factor, the riskier the product.

Earnings Per Share - It is backward looking, calculated using the one year current EPS divided by the one year EPS five years ago.

Effective Duration - The weighted average duration of all the bonds in a given portfolio, weighted by their dollar values.

Excess Return vs. Market - Average of the monthly arithmetic difference between the manager's return and the benchmark return over a specified time period, shown on an annualized basis.

Excess Return vs. Risk Free - Average of the monthly arithmetic difference between the manager's return and the risk-free return (i.e., BofA ML 3 Mo US T-Bill Index unless specified otherwise) over a specified time period, shown on an annualized basis.

Excess Risk - A measure of the standard deviation of a portfolio's performance relative to the risk free return.

Expense Ratios - Morningstar is the source for mutual fund expense ratios.

Gain/Loss - The net increase or decrease in the market value of a portfolio excluding its Net Cash Flow for a given period.

Indices - All indices and related information are considered intellectual property and are licensed by each index provider. The indices may not be copied, used or distributed without the index provider's prior written approval. Index providers make no warranties and bear no liability with respect to the indices, any related data, their quality, accuracy, suitability and/or completeness.



Information Ratio - Measured by dividing the active rate of return by the tracking error. The higher the information ratio, the more value-added contribution by the manager.

Liability Driven Investing (LDI) - A method to optimally structure asset investments relative to liabilities. The change in liabilities is estimated by the Ryan Labs Generic PPA Index of appropriate duration for that Plan. This benchmark is based on generic data and is therefore an approximation. RVK is not an actuarial firm, and does not have actuarial expertise.

Estimated Funded Status - The estimated ratio of a Plan's assets relative to its future liabilities. This is calculated by dividing the Plan's asset market value by the estimated present value of its liabilities. The higher the estimated funded status, the better the Plan's ability to cover its projected benefit obligations. An estimated funded status of 100% indicates a Plan that is fully funded. **Estimated PV of Liabilities** - An estimate of a Plan's future liabilities in present value terms. The beginning of the period liability is provided by the Plan's actuary. The period-end present value liability estimate provided in this report is derived by applying the estimated percentage change generated using the Ryan Labs Generic PPA Index with duration similar to that reported on the most recent actuarial valuation report.

Duration of Liabilities - The sensitivity of the value of a Plan's liabilities to changes in interest rates, as calculated by the Plan's actuary.

Duration of Assets - The dollar-weighted average duration of all the individual Plan assets.

Estimated Plan Hedge Ratio - The estimate of how well a Plan's investment portfolio is hedged against changes in interest rates - a primary driver of funded status movements. This is calculated by dividing the dollar-weighted values of both the Plan asset duration by the liability duration and multiplying by the estimated funded status. An estimated plan hedge ratio of zero indicates that the Plan's liabilities have not been hedged, whereas a value of one indicates fully hedged.

Modified Duration - The approximate percentage change in a bond's price for a 100 basis point change in yield.

Net Cash Flow - The sum, in dollars, of a portfolio's contributions and withdrawals. This includes all management fees and expenses only when performance shown is gross of fees.

Peer Groups -

Plan Sponsor Peer Groups - RVK utilizes the Mellon Analytical Solutions Trust Universe along with the Investment Metrics Plan Sponsor Universe. The combined Mellon Analytical Solutions Trust Universe and Investment Metrics Plan Sponsor Universe is used for comparison of total fund composite results and utilizes actual client returns compiled from consultant and custodial data. The Plan Sponsor Peer Group database includes performance and other quantitative data for over 2,100 plans which include corporate, endowment, foundation, public, and Taft Hartley plans. Plan Sponsor Peer Groups are gross of fees.

Institutional Peer Groups (Separate Account and Commingled Fund) - RVK utilizes the Investment Metrics Separate Account and Commingled Fund Manager Peer Groups for peer comparison and rankings. The Separate Account and Commingled Fund Peer Group database includes performance and other quantitative data for over 1,000 investment management firms, 6,400 investment products, across 100 standard peer groups. Separate Account and Commingled Fund Peer Groups are gross of fees.

Mutual Fund (MF) Peer Groups - RVK utilizes the Lipper Mutual Fund Manager Peer Groups for peer comparison and rankings. The Lipper Manager Peer Group database includes performance and other quantitative data for over 700 investment management firms and 24,500 investment products, across more than 140 standard peer groups. Mutual Fund Peer Groups are net of fees.

Percentile Rankings - Percentile rank compares an individual fund's performance with those of other funds within a defined peer group of managers possessing a similar investment style. Percentile rank identifies the percentage of a fund's peer group that has a higher return (or other comparative measurement) than the fund being ranked. Conversely, 100 minus the individual fund's ranking will identify the percentage of funds within the peer group that have a lower return than the fund being ranked.

1 - Highest Statistical Value 100 - Lowest Statistical Value

Example: American Funds AMCP;R-4 (RAFEX) is ranked in the 4th percentile within the IM US Equity Large-Cap Growth Funds (MF) Peer Group for the Sharpe Ratio. Within the IM US Equity Large-Cap Growth Funds peer group, 4% of the other funds performed better than American Funds AMCP;R-4 (RAFEX), while 96% of the funds performed worse.

Performance Methodology - RVK endorses the Global Investment Performance Standards (GIPS) and calculates performance for investment managers and composites using different methodologies. Investment manager performance is calculated by revaluing the portfolio on the date of all large external cash flows while composite performance is calculated using the Modified Dietz calculation methodology. According to the CFA Institute, "Only investment management firms that actually manage assets can claim compliance with the Standards. Plan Sponsors and consultants cannot make a claim of compliance unless they actually manage assets for which they are making a claim of compliance. They can claim to endorse the Standards and/or require that their investment managers comply with the Standards."

Investment Managers - Performance is calculated for interim periods between all large external cash flows for a given month and geometrically linked to calculate period returns. An external cash flow is defined as cash, securities, or assets that enter or exit a portfolio. RVK defines a "large cash flow" as a net aggregate cash flow of \geq 10% of the beginning-period portfolio market value or any cash flow that causes RVK calculated performance to deviate from manager/custodian reported performance in excess of 5 basis points for a given month.



Composites - The Modified Dietz methodology is utilized to calculate asset class, sub-asset class, and total fund composite performance. The Modified Dietz method calculates a time-weighted total rate of return that considers the timing of external cash flows; however, it does not utilize interim period performance to mitigate the impact of significant cash in- and outflows to the composite.

RVK calculates performance beginning with the first full month following inception. Since inception performance may vary from manager reported performance due to RVK using the first full month of returns as the inception date. Performance for both managers and composites is annualized for periods greater than one year.

Portfolio Characteristics - Due to disclosure guidelines set by each investment manager, portfolio characteristics shown are as of the most recent date available.

Private Equity Quartile Ranks – Private Equity quartile ranks are generated using vintage year peer group data provided by Thomson Reuters, and are based on each fund's annualized, since inception internal rate of return (IRR). Three Private Equity peer groups are available via Thomson Reuters: Buyout, Venture, and All Private Equity. Ranks are available quarterly, at a one-quarter lag.

Return - Compounded rate of return for the period.

%Return - The time-weighted rate of return of a portfolio for a given period.

R-Squared - The percentage of a portfolio's performance explained by the behavior of the appropriate benchmark. High R-Squared means a higher correlation of the portfolio's performance to the appropriate benchmark.

Risk Free Benchmark - BofA ML 3 Mo US T-Bill Index unless specified otherwise.

RVK Liquidity Rating - A qualitative method for determining the relative amount of liquidity in a portfolio. The characteristics considered when determining relative liquidity include trading volume, gates for redemption, leverage, nature of transactions, and pricing mechanisms. The RVK Liquidity Rating is calculated using beginning of month investment weights applied to each corresponding asset class liquidity rating.

Sharpe Ratio - Represents the excess rate of return over the risk-free return (i.e., BofA ML 3 Mo US T-Bill Index unless specified otherwise), divided by the standard deviation of the excess return. The result is the absolute rate of return per unit of risk. The higher the value, the better the product's historical risk-adjusted performance.

Simple Alpha - The difference between the manager's return and the benchmark's return.

Spread Duration - A measure of the price sensitivity of a bond to a 100 basis-point movement of the bond's spread relative to Treasurys.

Standard Deviation - A statistical measure of the range of a portfolio's performance. The variability of a return around its average return over a specified time period.



Time Period Abbreviations - QTD - Quarter-to-Date. CYTD - Calendar Year-to-Date. FYTD - Fiscal Year-to-Date. YOY - Year Over Year.

Thematic Classification - Represents dedicated manager allocations; as such, thematic allocations are approximations. RVK categorizes the following asset classes as Alpha, Capital Appreciation, Capital Preservation, and Inflation:

Total Fund Attribution - A method for identifying the sources of a total fund's over- or underperformance relative to its benchmark. The calculation identifies the contributions of positive or negative total fund excess return caused by allocation differences relative to the total fund's custom benchmark, and performance differences of the investment managers relative to the benchmark components that represent them.

Total Fund Performance -

Total Fund - The percentage return of the total fund for the specified time period.

Total Fund Benchmark - The percentage return of the total fund benchmark for the specified time period; calculated using the target asset allocation and the corresponding benchmark returns. **Total Value Added -** The percentage of over- or underperformance of the total fund as compared to the total fund benchmark.

Total Value Added -

Asset Allocation - Shows how the variance of the total fund's actual allocation from its target allocation added to or subtracted from fund performance.

Manager Value Added - The portion of the total value added attributable to the outperformance or underperformance of the fund's investment managers, relative to the individual benchmarks that represent them in the total fund benchmark.

Market Timing/Other - The contribution of other residual factors, including estimation error and transaction timing.

Total Fund Beta - Total Fund Beta is calculated using the S&P 500 as the benchmark. It represents a measure of the sensitivity of the total fund to movements in the S&P 500 and is a measure of the Total Fund's non-diversifiable or systematic risk.

Tracking Error - A measure of the standard deviation of a portfolio's performance relative to the performance of an appropriate market benchmark.

Treynor Ratio - Similar to Sharpe ratio, but focuses on beta rather than excess risk (standard deviation). Treynor ratio represents the excess rate of return over the risk-free rate (i.e., BofA ML 3 Mo US T-Bill Index unless specified otherwise) divided by the beta. The result is the absolute rate of return per unit of risk. The higher the value, the better historical risk-adjusted performance.

Unit Value - The dollar value of a portfolio, assuming an initial nominal investment of \$100, growing at the compounded rate of %Return for a given period.

Up Market Capture - Up market by definition is positive benchmark return and up market capture represents the ratio in % terms of the average portfolios return over the benchmark during the up market period. The higher the value of the up market capture the better the product's performance.

Yield to Maturity - The rate of return achieved on a bond or other fixed income security assuming the security is bought and held to maturity and that the coupon interest paid over the life of the bond will be reinvested at the same rate of return.

Yield to Worst - The bond yield calculated by using the worst possible yield taking into consideration all call, put, and optional sink dates.
